The Great Science Share – inspiring us all to share science!

or a couple of years now, I have been toying with ideas of how to raise the profile of primary science through a national campaign. It is great that others were thinking along the same lines, especially now as we see the BBC's Terrific Scientific and the Wellcome Trust's Explorify campaigns hitting the national stage (see Websites).

For me, the aim was to explore how the coming together of science teachers and advocates, from a wide range of sectors, could collaboratively make a difference. How could we engage, inspire and share science learning with new audiences? How could we raise awareness and the profile of the subject we know can make significant changes to children's

choices in future?

The stimulus of Manchester's designation as the European City of Science in 2016 gave some momentum to this idea. Reflecting on what had been working well, we identified Manchester University's SEEIRH Fascinate Children-to-Children conference (see Websites) as the centrepiece of our development and the rest is history so they say! The Great Science Share (GSS) was born and the summer months of 2016 were successful in achieving mass participation in a collaborative event, where children, parents, students, teachers and business shared science together. On 5 July 2017, the *Great Science Share* is back! With the core focus being an inspiring event for primary and secondary schools and their communities, we want this year to build on the success of last.

These have offered opportunity for early years, primary, secondary, further and higher education teachers as well as business leaders to share in discussion and development of science.
